

Washi: Strength, Beauty & Endless Potential

Processed by hand from locally harvested gampi, mitsumata and/or paper mulberry wood fibers, *washi* is traditional Japanese paper that has more than withstood the test of time. Wa (Japanese) *shi* (paper) is not only stronger than conventional modern paper made from wood pulp, it is also intrinsically beautiful and, being supple, can be applied to a wide variety of applications both practical and artistic.
